There is still room in the addressing workshop that will be held on Wednesday, February 22nd.

Workshop: **Building an Address Repository Using the FGDC Standard: Implementing Quality and Data Sharing.** Taught by Martha Wells of Spatial Focus.

This workshop will focus on three separate areas of addressing activities at the local government level:

1. Understanding your existing addresses and address reference system (business rules)
2. Understanding how to get your existing address information into a single MAR using standards to manage quality
3. Address assignment and maintenance: keeping your address information current and trustworthy

This workshop is not highly technical, but is aimed at GIS and other staff members who are creating and managing addresses within their local government. There will be discussion on the FGDC and NENA standards, the benefits of having address data that is trustworthy and in a functional database, and connectivity between the MAR, GIS, and other business applications.

South Carolina begins preparations for NG9-1-1



The state of South Carolina has been at work on the beginning stages of implementing their 5-year Next Generation 9-1-1 (NG9-1-1) Strategic Plan. Several subcommittees have been created to get input and assistance from different groups within the state as to how to make the necessary changes to prepare the state for transition into NG9-1-1. Since GIS is such an integral component of NG9-1-1, a GIS subcommittee has been organized to establish a process to integrate local GIS data into a statewide GIS database to be used in statewide NG9-1-1 Core Services. The GIS subcommittee is made up of local 911 and GIS officials from around the state, as well as SC CMRS committee members. Currently they are working to gather information from each county about their data schema and 911

database and the types of layers contained within the database. If you work with GIS, addressing or E9-1-1 in a South Carolina county and you haven't been contacted or filled out a questionnaire concerning your E9-1-1 CAD and GIS Data, please contact David Morrison with the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office at David.morrison@rfa.sc.gov.
